Isaiah 58:9-12 (see animation)

⁹ [...] If you do away with the yoke of oppression, with the pointing finger and malicious talk,
¹⁰ and if you spend yourselves in behalf of the hungry and satisfy the needs of the oppressed, then your light will rise in the darkness, and your night will become like the noonday.
¹¹ The LORD will guide you always;

he will satisfy your needs in a sun-scorched land and will strengthen your frame.

Points to Ponder

- We are called by God to act for the oppressed. Is there evidence of that in our daily lives?
- Where is injustice in our own context? In the range of possible reactions, from indifference to rage, how do we respond when we see it?
- How can we enable the downtrodden to realise their potential and live life to the full? What part can we play in building up those who are broken down?
- How are communities and individuals changed by the attention we pay to exploitation and those involved?
