Stephen Pattison,

'Pastoral Care is that activity, undertaken especially by representative Christian persons, directed towards the elimination and relief of sin and sorrow and the presentation of all people perfect in Christ to God'.



Alastair Campbell,

Pastoral Care are 'Those activities of the Church which are directed towards maintaining or restoring the health and wholeness of individuals and communities in the context of God's redemptive purposes for all creation... It has one fundamental aim: to help people to know love, both as something to be received and as something to give'.



Pastoral Care is concerned with:

- Offering emotional, mental, physical and spiritual healing;
- Strengthening and sustaining those who find themselves in difficult places;
- Providing counsel and guidance for those who find themselves lost and in need of direction;
- Presenting the opportunity of reconciliation to those who are estranged from others / God.
