DO OSTRICHES HAVE EYEBROWS?

Scene:

A bus-stop, late on Christmas Eve. Organist or church band plays the tune of "O come, O come Emmanuel" as character A enters, and stands by the bus-stop sign. Then character B joins A. They pause for 10 seconds or so, shivering, glancing up and down the road and looking at their watches. The music stops at the end of the verse.

- A: I wonder when it might come.
- B: When what might come?
- A: The bus.
- B: What bus?
- A: The bus I'm waiting for.
- B: [Pause] That depends.
- A: Depends on what?
- B: On what bus you want.
- A: What bus do I want?
- B: Where're you going?
- A: The far end of town.
- B: OK: you've got the 10, the 10A or the 44.
- A: What's the difference?
- B: Well, the 10 goes through the estate, round by the supermarket then takes a left at the statue of the man with the dog and the moustache.
- A: The dog has a moustache?
- B: What I meant was ... no, never mind.
- A: What about the 10A?

- B: Same as the 10, except it takes a right at the statue and goes into town by the canal.
- A: The bus goes in by the canal?
- B: What I meant was ... no, never mind. It skirts round the edge of the cemetery then takes a left at the Gravediggers' Arms.
- A: Big arms, I shouldn't wonder.
- B: What I meant was ... no, never mind.
- A: So that leaves the 44.
- B: It's the express.
- A: Where to?
- B: All the way to the terminus, of course. [Shakes his head.]

[C enters, joining the queue]

C: Evening!

A&B:Evening!

- C: Been waiting long?
- B: [Wearily] As long as it takes.
- C: How long <u>does</u> it take?
- B: That depends.
- C: Depends on what?
- B: On what you're waiting for.
- C: And what <u>are</u> you waiting for?
- A: Me, I seem to be waiting for a 10, a 10A or a 44.
- C: And how about you? Are you waiting too?
- B: Good question. ... Yes ... yes, I am. I'm waiting too.
- C: What for?

- B: Just waiting really. Hoping that "something" might arrive in time for Christmas.
- A: What kind of "something"?
- B: I don't know. A surprise "something", perhaps? An unexpected arrival?
- A: Like a 10, a 10A or a 44?
- B: Yeah. Or maybe a <u>really</u> unexpected arrival.
- A: Like a canal boat? Or a hot air balloon? Or an ostrich-drawn racing buggy? Now that would be really unexpected.
- C: Yes, I can see that an ostrich at a [INSERT PARISH NAME] bus stop on Christmas Eve might raise an eyebrow.
- A: Do ostriches have eyebrows?
- C: What I meant was ... no, never mind.

[Pause]

- B: There's certainly a lot of waiting to do on Christmas Eve.
- A: [Looking at watch] Waiting, waiting, waiting.
- B: I wonder when it might come.
- C: When what might come?
- B: The unexpected arrival.
- C: What unexpected arrival?
- B: The unexpected arrival I'm hoping for.
- C: That depends.
- B: Depends on what?
- C: On what kind of unexpected arrival you're hoping for.
- B: What kind of unexpected arrival should I be hoping for?
- C: Perhaps the kind that arrives when you least expect it. Maybe even in the darkest of moments.

B: Like light in the darkness?

C: Like light in the darkness.

A: So it's light. <u>How light</u>? As light as a feather?

C: What I meant was ... no, never mind. Don't worry. It'll come.

B: What'll come?

C: The arrival. The special arrival.

B: It had better be worth the wait.

C: Oh yes, it'll be worth the wait.

A: Worth the weight? Will it be worth its weight <u>in gold</u>?

C: What I meant was ... [long pensive pause] ... well actually ... yes. This arrival, this special arrival, will be worth its weight in gold.
